The Theophany at Home

January is the season for house blessings. Jordan water from the Theophany service should be provided for Father to do the blessing, which ideally starts in the family icon corner, or the dining table. The parish priest comes in his role as spiritual father, and is able to be welcomed by the family in their own domestic church, the extension of the parish community. It is not a time to worry about the house being spotless: more important is that the family's interior life is spotless! You can read more about this in: <u>Guide to the Domestic Church</u> which is available in the bookstore.

Any unblessed religious object should be placed there, on a white cloth. Radio, television, and internet should be turned off so that everyone can focus on this religious ceremony. The mother takes a lit candle and leads Father through the house, turning on the electric lights as they go. The family joins in singing the Theophany troparion, either at the icon corner or the family table, or in a little procession. Every room is blessed, and all exterior doors are blessed "in the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit" while Father sprinkles holy water.

It is a common practice to offer a little something to eat and to visit for a while, as this is a chance to have the pastor in the home. But please be considerate of the schedule which Father may have going for other visits to be made.

Sunday after Theophany / Synaxis of St John the Baptist

Today we commemorate Saint John the Baptist for his unique role as Forerunner of Jesus Christ, and for his role as The Baptizer of the Lord.

Next Sunday is the Sunday of Zacchaeus, which begins the preparation for Great Lent/ the Great Fast. Pascha is on April 1 this year, so the Lenten preparations come very early in 2018.

Saints of the Week

- Jan 10 St Gregory of Nyssa, one of the Cappadocian Fathers of the Church, a member of Saint Basil's family, of whom several were saints or martyrs. He was made bishop of the new eparchy of Nyssa in 372, participated in Councils and local synods, tried to reconcile heretics with the Church, and wrote copiously. He especially wrote about the Holy Trinity. He condemned slavery fiercely, even in the modified form practiced in the Roman empire, as an offense against God and the dignity of people.
- Jan 11 St Theodosius, Founder of the Common Life Monasticism is integral to the life of the Church, both Eastern and Western. Theodosius was born around 424, in modern Turkey. He first moved to Jerusalem, where he built a church in honor of Our Lady near the Tower of David. The flood of pilgrims and curious asking for spiritual advice caused him to withdraw to live as a hermit in the mountains. He spent most of the day and night in prayer or working in his modest garden, and ate little (not tasting bread for 30 years!). Eventually he agreed to the establishment of a community of monks, who were especially devoted to caring for the sick, elderly, and mentally handicapped. Saint Sabbas appointed him as the leader of the monks in Palestine who lived in common monasteries, and his Monastery of Saint Theodosius still stands near Bethlehem. He died in 529 at the age of 105.
