

Why do we keep St. Philip's Fast?

Unlike the Great Fast before the Feast of the Resurrection (Pascha), the Philipian fast became little practiced in the Byzantine Church in America. Often it is confused with the shorter Roman Catholic practice of Advent. It has few services or hymns, and only two special Sundays. Yet the Philipian Fast is an ancient practice in preparation for the Incarnation and Theophany of the Lord Jesus Christ.

This 40 day fast is important and has been steadily reemphasized and spread in parishes. The Philipian Fast can help us to better understand and appreciate God's entire saving plan.

Theologically, the birth and the public ministry of Christ are inextricable linked. The Philipian Fast was created to prepare us to receive Christ into the world (Christmas) and begin His public ministry (Theophany). They are two sides of a single coin.

On arriving at Bethlehem and the Nativity on December 25th, we begin to prepare for the Theophany. We do not stop at the Nativity. In our joy at God's arrival, we press forward and see the Theophany.

With Theophany we experience the beginning of Christ's revelation to us of the mysteries of God. Most important of all, this event points out the Mystery of the Trinity, a mystery long hinted in the Old Testament.

The regulations of this Fast are not as strict, as it falls during the winter, and so abstinence remains in force for Friday, and is recommended for Wednesday and also Monday. Christmas Eve is a day of strict fast.

This second lesson in our 3-part series on seeking the Kingdom of God focuses on how to live out an active Byzantine Catholic faith by

READING SACRED SCRIPTURE

You may say to yourself, "Who, me? I don't know how to interpret Scripture! Bishops, priests and people who study theology are supposed to do that." While this is true, each individual Catholic must also know the teachings of Christ as revealed by the Holy Spirit in Sacred Scripture.

St. Jerome in the 4th Century taught that, "Ignorance of Scriptures is ignorance of Christ." St. John Chrysostom wrote, "...but when you are at home, persevere continually in reading the Divine Scriptures."

In prayer, you communicate with God. Through Sacred Scripture, God communicates Himself to you. This is why so many great Saints of the Catholic Church stressed its importance.

You do not have to be afraid of being unable to interpret Scripture. The Holy Spirit guides you as you read thoughtfully and prayerfully. Begin with the New Testament. Read a small portion of the Gospels daily. Take a few moments at the beginning to ask the Holy Spirit to prepare your heart to receive God's Word, to love God's Word, and to live God's Word. In addition, there are numerous great resources that can help you understand God's Word and how to apply it to your daily life.

If you have a Bible, read it. If you do not have a Bible, purchase a good Catholic version, such as The Catholic Study Bible or The Ignatius Study Bible. Both of these have excellent footnotes, maps, charts and useful commentaries to help with your understanding and application.

For further study, The Bible and the Holy Fathers is a patristic commentary that follows our Church's daily scripture readings. In addition, The Catholic Bible Dictionary by Scott Hahn is a wonderful resource.

You may ask, "What will reading Scripture do for me in the long run?" If you persevere in prayerful meditation on God's living Word in Sacred Scripture, this will happen:

- · During difficult trials, the Holy Spirit will remind you of stories in Sacred Scripture that can help you decide how you are to react and respond.
- · Your prayer life will change. The words of Scripture will enrich your daily prayers and you will begin to pray more for others.
- · You will grow in holiness and in mercy.
- Sacred Scripture reveals the hidden, incredible mystery that God became man, fully human and fully divine, one person without confusion. It instills the truths of the human condition and how much God loves you in spite of your weaknesses and failures.
- · You will be reminded that sin is to be avoided at all cost. It is very easy to lose focus on God in the middle of daily activities, and to fall into sick behaviors. The soul responds to whatever it receives. Just as you need good food and exercise for your body to be healthy, the same goes for your soul. By feeding your soul with Sacred Scripture each day, you open your heart to the stirrings of the Holy Spirit, and gain the strength and wisdom to live a life of love and virtue.
- You will have the desire to share your faith in Jesus with others, so that they too can experience His love and mercy.

The Tresentation of the Theotokos

The **Presentation of the Theotokos** into the Temple, also called **The Entrance**, is one of the Great Feasts of the Byzantine Rite, celebrated on November 21.

According to the legends the Virgin Mary was presented by her parents, SS. Joachim and Anne, to the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem as a young girl. One of the earliest sources of this tradition is the non-canonical* *Protoevangelion of James*, also called the *Infancy Gospel of James*, composed in Syria around 150 AD.

In the story, Mary was solemnly received by the temple community which was headed by the priest Zacharias, the father of John the Baptist. She was led inside, accompanied by virgins, to live inside the Holy of Holies, to prepare her to become the living sanctuary of God when she would conceive the Divine Child. She was fed by the angels, until the age of twelve when she was betrothed to Joseph, who was an old man.

This Proto-evangelion was one of several "Infancy Gospels" which were created about the unknown lives of Jesus and Mary. They are filled with miraculous and often stunning events, while giving many popular images which have endured to our day (Joseph as an old widower, the hiding of John the Baptist and his mother during the Massacre of the Innocents).

These "gospels" were pious stories which would convey the specialness of Jesus and His Mother, and answer the demands of the popular and pious imagination. They were written with little knowledge of Judaism and its practices, and often incorporate pagan practices known to the Roman empire's population, such as temple virgins.

So why commemorate liturgically something which we know, through biblical archaeology and Jewish studies, to have never taken place? The symbolism of today links the Holy-of-Holies with the womb of the Mother of God which will become the living chamber of the Most High.

Secondary is the specialness of Mary as a person: in the legend she is an all-pure and all-holy, which of course she is in church dogma. St. Gregory Palamas preached:

God is born of the spotless and Holy Virgin, or better to say, of the Most Pure and All-Holy Virgin. She is above every fleshly defilement, and even above every impure thought. Her conceiving resulted not from fleshly lust, but by the overshadowing of the Most Holy Spirit. Such desire being utterly alien to Her, it is through prayer and spiritual readiness that She declared to the angel: "Behold the handmaiden of the Lord; be it unto Me according to thy word" (Luke 1:38), and that She conceived and gave birth. So, in order to render the Virgin worthy of this sublime purpose, God marked this ever-virgin Daughter now praised by us, from before the ages, and from eternity, choosing Her from out of His elect.

*Non-canonical means a book that was not accepted into the Bible because it was not inspired by the Holy Spirit.

Greek Catholic priests in Slovakia give children a special blessing at the church on this feast day. The prayer used is from the Book of Numbers, chapter 6, vv 24-26, the blessing which God tells Aaron and his successor priests to use on the children. Thus, this is one of the most ancient rituals done from the Bible, and it finds a comfortable home in our Byzantine Catholic Church which is filled with Scripture and rites which are often rooted in Judaism. The fact that the giving of this blessing is restricted to only priests – and not parents - continues the Jewish tradition of it being a part of the Temple ritual celebrated by the priests.

At the ambon prayer, the priest reads this blessing, and blesses the children with holy water.
