The 40 Day Fast before Christmas/Filipvka (Fast of St. Philip will begin next Tuesday, November 15. What can I do to prepare my soul for the coming of the Christ Child?)

The Byzantine Catholic Church invites all to participate more fully in the central mysteries of the Gospel of Jesus Christ through her calendar of feasts and fasts.

The feast of the Nativity of Our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ (Christmas, December 25) is one of the great feasts of the Church year, celebrating the coming or advent of the **Messiah** (which in Hebrew means "He who is anointed by the Spirit" and in Greek, is **Christos**), Jesus Christ. Christ was born into the world through the Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary to offer us the wondrous gifts of salvation and theosis, our transformation into the likeness of God by sharing in His holiness through the energies of His grace.

There will be no CAFE on November 8, due to people wanting to watch the elections. Please pray fervently for our country after the difficult presidential campaign, for peace and unity, and pray always for American society to reflect the values and principles of the Church.

Do you have spare cardboard boxes you can bring in for Fr. Chris' dog Frost? At the shelter, treats are hidden in the boxes and then the dogs forage inside them, to their delight. Feel free to bring boxes by, and Frost will thank you happily.

COMING SOON - Mission Society Christmas Cards!!!

Our newly designed Christmas cards to support our mother church in Mukachevo, Ukraine go on sale next Sunday, November 13th. The Russian-backed war has resulted in severe inflation, reducing income to only 50% of pre-war levels, crippling their work. Please encourage your relatives, friends, co-workers to buy our cards and to spread the joy of Jesus' Birth by helping the resurrection of the Byzantine Catholic Church's mother eparchy!

A packet of 5 cards sell for \$10 including envelopes. Fill out the slip with the names of the recipients and return by mail or drop them by the parish office. All names will be sent to Bishop Milan Sasik in the Ukraine. On January 7th (Old Calendar), the Bishop will place all of these names on the altar and pray for each individual. The last day to purchase cards will be Sunday, December 18th.

Saint Michael the Archangel

November 8 is the "Synaxis of the Holy, Heavenly, Bodiless Powers", or Saint Michael the Archangel, and all the choirs of Angels. This includes our own Guardian Angels. Some say that we have guardian angels assigned to us when we are conceived in our mother's wombs. Others say, as in the baptismal ritual, that they are given to us when we are baptized. Either way, we are blessed with angels who try to steer us in the right direction and watch over us. St. Michael himself is the one who led the armies of heaven in casting rebellious Lucifer and his troops out, and he is often shown as defeating Satan, holding the scales of judgment for the dead in his hand, and always in military armor. In Russia, icons depict him riding his horse and sounding the trumpet to announce the Last Judgment.

Angels abound in the Bible, serving as God's messengers and helping His people. They appear in icons, worshipping Christ, honoring Our Lady the Theotokos, praising God. In the Liturgy, we believe that angels escort the clergy through the Royal Doors at both Entrances, and come down from heaven to gather around the altar. At the Great Entrance, we say that we mystically represent the angels who surround God's altar in heaven with full attention. When we sing the "Holy, Holy, Holy" we invoke that very image in our minds, of the heavenly host joyfully surrounding our altar to attend the Sacrifice of the Holy Eucharist. Isn't that a great mental picture to have in mind? Like the angels, we are to be happy to be in church, attentive to what is happening, and worshipping God with devotion.

We celebrate this feast of unity between angels and humans, and this unity is not in the "life to come" at the end of times — it starts in this world: the angels direct and guard the sons of God who are struggling in this world; they are glad with every sinner returning to God; they convey the prayers to God's throne. Hence, there is a common liturgical work between angels and humans. The angels offer a non-stop continuous doxology and mental worship with humans to God. They offer to the Holy Trinity the Trisagion: "with these holy powers, we sinners say the trisagion, 'Holy, Holy, Holy Lord of hosts, the heavens and earth are filled with Thy glory, hosanna in the highest, blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, hosanna in the highest' ". They gather around the holy altar with the priest to serve with him the liturgy.

So there is only one celebration, one feast common between humans and angels: "angels with humans celebrate together, earthly with heavenly speak," and "through thy cross our Christ our God, the angels and humans become one church, heaven and earth are united, O Lord glory to Thee." The angels are members of the Church, the body of Christ. The 8th of November is also a specific feast of Archangel Michael, going back in history in celebrating the memory of his church in Arcadia in Constantinople.

The angels are a "heavenly army." Their leader and head is Archangel Michael, who is one of the seven spirits in front of God's throne. "O Holy Archangel Michael glorified, God has placed you head of their Hosts, Powers, Angels and Archangels, Dominions, and Principalities" (Exapostolarion of the feast).

According to St. Dimitri of Rostov, some of the archangels are the closest to God. They are Michael (*Missa-iil* in Hebrew), which means "Who is like God," Gabriel (*Jibra-iil* in Hebrew), which means "God's power," Raphael (*Roupha-iil* in Hebrew), which means "God's mercy."

In the Byzantine Rite, Monday is always dedicated to the holy angels, and the Dismissal Prayer includes the phrase "through the intercession of the holy, bodiless, powers of heaven."
