Presentation of the Lord, or Encounter of the Lord with His People by Fr. Christopher Zugger

This feast, on Monday this week, marks the end of the forty days of Christmas. Known as the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple, in the Slavic tradition it is called **The Encounter of Christ**, emphasizing the meeting of the Infant Savior with St Symeon and St Anna. The **Vespers describes Simeon's joy at being allowed to cradle in his arms the Savior of the world.**

On this feast, the Holy Family travels from Bethlehem to Jerusalem, obviously before the Massacre of the Innocents and the Flight into Egypt. There, under the very nose of the wicked King Herod who would soon be stewing in his palace wondering about the Messiah who the Magi said was born in Bethlehem, Mary and Joseph come to fulfill the Law.

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There were two reasons: one was the purification demanded of Mary by the Jewish law, for in giving birth she had shed blood, and thus was unclean. Second was that of redeeming the first-born male child by giving a sacrifice to God. For the poor, which Mary and Joseph were, they had to offer only a pair of doves or pigeons as the sacrifice. **Neither Mary nor Jesus needed this ritual, but they submit out of obedience and to give good example to others. Their humility and desire to avoid scandal should be imitated by us today!**

The hymns of this feast emphasize the Encounter theme. Here **Christ is meeting His people for the first time, in the Temple where God Himself dwelled behind the veil of the Holy of Holies**, and the Temple to which He would give Himself at the age of twelve. He Who gave the Law to Moses on Sinai, now submits to the Law in all humility. Now He is recognized by Simeon and Anna, who exemplify the *anawim*, the holy little ones of Israel.

God had promised Simeon that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah, and the Holy Spirit prompts him to go to this little family in the midst of the teeming crowds in the temple courtyard. Deeply moved, Symeon utters his marvelous prayer, the *Nunc Dimittis*, or *Now You Shall Dismiss Your Servant*. This wonderful prayer is sung at every Vespers service:

Now you shall dismiss Your servant, O Lord, according to Your word in truth, for my eyes have seen the salvation which You prepared, before the face of all peoples. A light to the revelation of the Gentiles, and the glory of Your people, Israel.

Anna is another classic member of the *anawim* of Israel, those who are poor and humble and deeply loved by God, and who love Him in return and depend upon Him. She is a widow without a family to take care of her, she is extremely old for that time period and so has outlived all whom she knew. Yet she does not live in grief and regret, but instead prays and fasts constantly. This prophetess confirms Simeon's words and tells "all who would listen" as to the marvelous destiny of this little baby boy.

The tale of the shepherds who had seen the marvelous birth in Bethlehem and spread the news among the hill villages of Judea, the heartland of both Judaism and *anawim*, surely reached the ears of Herod's spies. Combine this event with the shepherds, and the visit of the Magi who never returned, no wonder Herod is ready to kill the new-born King!

We should be transformed by our own individual encounter with Jesus the Child and Lord on this 40th day after Christmas. While our Church has already shifted into the Preparation for Great Lent by now, and Christmas carols and cards are already a memory, a true personal encounter with the transforming power of Jesus should always be close to our hearts and at the forefront of our minds!

Each soul ought to be a Temple of God, to which Mary brings Jesus. And each one of us should, like Simeon, take the child in his arms and say to the Father: 'My eyes have seen thy salvation." -Year of Grace of the Lord, p. 90.



Blessing of Candles

Candles are so much associated with the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, that this feast was known as Candlemas in medieval England - Candle Mass. As Jesus is the Light of the world and is revealed as the Messiah in this feast, candles are blessed on this day. You can bring your own, or buy some of the church's candles. Either way, be sure to leave church with a couple of blessed candles to use in your icon corner or in hanging lamps in front of icons. If purchasing candles, please leave your offering in the basket on the table in front of the iconostas.

Softener of Evil Hearts Icon – by Fr. Christopher Zugger February 2

An auxiliary icon of this feast is one popular in the Slavic Churches, "Sorrows of the Mother of God" also called "Softener of Hearts". All of these icons show Mary in the Roman Catholic style of seven swords, for the Sorrows of the Virgin, not a single sword. A pious belief is that praying before this icon on Sunday will bring protection for the seven days of the week.

The Seven Sorrows are:

- the prophecy itself (Luke 2:34-35);
- the flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13);
- losing Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:43-45):
- meeting Jesus as He carries His cross;
- the death of Jesus (John 19:25)
- receiving Jesus' body
- burying Jesus in the tomb (John 19:40-



Why Softener of Evil Hearts?

Just as Christ would be pierced with nails and a spear, so the soul of Mary would be pierced by sorrow and pain in the heart, when she saw her Son's suffering. After that, the heretofore hidden thoughts of the people regarding the Messiah would be revealed, and they would face a choice: to be with Christ, or against Him. Thus, Simeon's prophecy is completely fulfilled: "Yea, a sword shall pierce through thy own soul also, that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."
