

"But seek first the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you."-Matthew 6:33 Last month we discussed the importance of prayer. This second lesson in our 3-part series on seeking the Kingdom of God focuses on how to live out an active Byzantine Catholic faith by

READING SACRED SCRIPTURE

You may say to yourself, "Who, me? I don't know how to interpret Scripture! Bishops, priests and people who study theology are supposed to do that." While this is true, each individual Catholic must also know the teachings of Christ as revealed by the Holy Spirit in Sacred Scripture.

St. Jerome in the 4th Century taught that, "Ignorance of Scriptures is ignorance of Christ." St. John Chrysostom wrote, "...but when you are at home, persevere continually in reading the Divine Scriptures."

In prayer, you communicate with God. Through Sacred Scripture, God communicates Himself to you. This is why so many great Saints of the Catholic Church stressed its importance.

You do not have to be afraid of being unable to interpret Scripture. The Holy Spirit guides you as you read thoughtfully and prayerfully. Begin with the New Testament. Read a small portion of the Gospels daily. Take a few moments at the beginning to ask the Holy Spirit to prepare your heart to receive God's Word, to love God's Word, and to live God's Word. In addition, there are numerous great resources that can help you understand God's Word and how to apply it to your daily life.

If you have a Bible, read it. If you do not have a Bible, purchase a good Catholic version, such as The Catholic Study Bible or The Ignatius Study Bible. Both of these have excellent footnotes, maps, charts and useful commentaries to help with your understanding and application.

For further study, The Bible and the Holy Fathers is a patristic commentary that follows our Church's daily scripture readings. In addition, The Catholic Bible Dictionary by Scott Hahn is a wonderful resource.

You may ask, "What will reading Scripture do for me in the long run?" If you persevere in prayerful meditation on God's living Word in Sacred Scripture, this will happen:

- · During difficult trials, the Holy Spirit will remind you of stories in Sacred Scripture that can help you decide how you are to react and respond.
- · Your prayer life will change. The words of Scripture will enrich your daily prayers and you will begin to pray more for others.
- · You will grow in holiness and in mercy.
- Sacred Scripture reveals the hidden, incredible mystery that God became man, fully human and fully divine, one person without confusion. It instills the truths of the human condition and how much God loves you in spite of your weaknesses and failures.
- · You will be reminded that sin is to be avoided at all cost. It is very easy to lose focus on God in the middle of daily activities, and to fall into sick behaviors. The soul responds to whatever it receives. Just as you need good food and exercise for your body to be healthy, the same goes for your soul. By feeding your soul with Sacred Scripture each day, you open your heart to the stirrings of the Holy Spirit, and gain the strength and wisdom to live a life of love and virtue.
- · You will have the desire to share your faith in Jesus with others, so that they too can experience His love and mercy.

Next month we will conclude our lessons on seeking the Kingdom of God by learning "How to live a Holy and Eucharistic Life."

Archangel Michael

November 8 is the "Synaxis of the Holy, Heavenly, Bodiless Powers", or Saint Michael the Archangel, and all the choirs of Angels. This includes our own Guardian Angels. Some say that we have guardian angels assigned to us when we are conceived in our mother's wombs! Others say, as in the baptismal ritual, that they are given to us when we are baptized. Either way, we are blessed with angels who try to steer us in the right direction and watch over us. St. Michael himself is the one who led the armies of heaven in casting rebellious Lucifer and his troops out, and he is often shown as defeating Satan, holding the scales of judgment for the dead in his hand, and always in military armor. In Russia, icons depict him riding his horse and sounding the trumpet to announce the Last Judgment.

Angels abound in the Bible, serving as God's messengers and helping His people. They appear in icons, worshipping Christ, honoring Our Lady the Theotokos, praising God. In the Liturgy, we believe that angels escort the clergy through the Royal Doors at both Entrances, and come down from heaven to gather around the altar. At the Great Entrance, we say that we mystically represent the angels: who surround God's altar in heaven with full attention. When we sing the "Holy, Holy, Holy" we invoke that very image in our minds, of the heavenly host joyfully surrounding our altar to attend the Sacrifice of the Holy Eucharist. Isn't that a great mental picture to have in mind? Like the angels, we are to be happy to be in church, attentive to what is happening, and worshipping God with devotion.

Saint Michael is the most popular of the angels. High places in Europe are dedicated to him, from Wales to Italy. Cemetery chapels were usually dedicated to him, as it was the popular belief that he accompanies souls at the hour of their death to their personal judgment before God, and so be sent to heaven, purgatory, or hell. Island monasteries in Europe were also under his protection, such as the famous Mont-St Michael in the English Channel; as he defends against the devil, so those monastery forts defended Europe's interior from Viking raiders. In the Roman Catholic Mass before Vatican II, the Prayer to St. Michael was recited at the end, imploring his help in defeating Satan and his wicked minions "seeking the ruin of souls."

We celebrate this feast of unity between angels and humans, and this unity is not in the "life to come" at the end of times — it starts in this world: the angels direct, guard the sons of God who are struggling in this world; they are glad with every sinner returning to God; they convey the prayers to God's throne. Hence, there is a common liturgical work between angels and humans. The angels offer a non-stop continuous doxology and mental worship with humans to God. They offer to the Holy Trinity the Trisagion: "with these holy powers, we sinners say the trisagion, 'Holy, Holy, Holy Lord of hosts, the heavens and earth are filled with Thy glory, hosanna in the highest, blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, hosanna in the highest' ". They gather around the holy altar with the priest to serve with him the liturgy.
