From December 8 until November 20,

2016, the Catholic Church will observe a Jubilee "Year of Mercy", whose motto is "Merciful Like the Father." It is meant to live this spiritual year as a time of pilgrimage, in which the traditional observances and seasons - feast days, Christmas Fast, Great Lent - are experienced in a unique way.

We are also called to individual conversion, to imitate the love of God Himself in all our interactions. Cathedrals, most shrines, and designated churches will have Doors of Mercy. When one makes a pilgrimage to Rome or to one of these special churches, one can obtain a plenary indulgence - the remission of temporal punishment due to sin.

The Pope writes to us: I wish that the Jubilee Indulgence may reach each one as a genuine experience of God's mercy, which comes to meet each person in the Face of the Father who welcomes and forgives, forgetting completely the sin committed.

There have been only 29 years of jubilee in the entire history of the Church, so this is a special time for all of us. More will follow next week.

Are You Seeking the Kingdom of God? -- Part 3.

Lesson in Evangelization – Receive the Holy Eucharist "But seek first the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." Matthew 6:33

In the previous two lessons of this evangelization series, we discussed the importance of prayer and reading sacred scripture. This lesson focuses on how to live out an authentic Byzantine Catholic faith by becoming united with Christ through...

RECEIVING THE HOLY EUCHARIST

Every time you receive the Divine Eucharist you are making a statement. By receiving the Eucharist you declare not only that you have committed yourself to Christ our King and God, but that you commit yourself to advancing His Kingdom in this world.

By participating in the Eucharistic banquet you publicly affirm that you believe Christ Jesus is your King and Redeemer. You publicly agree to follow Him and to carry your cross as He did. You publicly agree to serve others and to follow His command to proclaim the Gospel to every living creature.

You might think, "Wait a minute! I love receiving Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, but how can this require me to share His message with others? Isn't that the priest's job? Shouldn't Reverend Deacon be doing that?" Absolutely--but so should you. You are publicly agreeing that you will proclaim the Gospel when you come forward to receive Jesus in the Holy Mystery of the Eucharist.

The Eucharistic life is one that is willing to be broken and offered to God the Father. During the Anaphora, the priest repeats the words of Jesus saying, "Take, eat, this is My Body, which is broken for you." Jesus' Body was broken voluntarily for us in sacrifice and the benefits of that sacrifice are shared with us.

The Eucharistic bread participates in that once and for all sacrifice. In doing so, the bread of the precious Body is also broken into pieces making it possible to be shared with the many. We too must allow our own selfish will to be broken and give ourselves completely to God to be broken and shared with others in His Name.

In the next lesson on evangelization, we will review what it means to be a servant.

Holy Maternity of St. Anna Conception of St. Anne Immaculate Conception December 8

We keep the feast of the Conception of Saint Anne/ Conception of the Theotokos, known in the West as the Immaculate Conception. Declared a dogma in 1854, the Immaculate Conception was taught by many Church Fathers and spiritual writers for centuries.

In the Eastern Churches, this is kept on December 9, in order to emphasize that though sinless, Our Lady is still inferior to Christ, Who alone has a perfect pregnancy (March 25-December 25). However, the Latin Church preferred the date of December 8, giving Our Lady a perfect pregnancy (December 8 – September 8). In the United States, which is dedicated to the Immaculate Conception, our Byzantine Catholic Church has accepted the December 8th date.

The dogma teaches this: the Blessed Virgin Mary "in the first instance of her conception, by a singular privilege and grace granted by God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved exempt from all stain of original sin. (Pope Pius IX)."

The feast of the Conception of Saint Anne originates in the monasteries of Palestine in the late 600s; it spread through the Syriac and Byzantine Churches so that by 1166 it was a holy day of obligation in the Byzantine Empire with no work allowed. In the texts of this feast, Mary is acclaimed as all-holy, immaculate, sinless, and most pure.

Saint Nicholas

Saint Nicholas is one of the most popular of all Saints in the East, and there are countless stories that tell of his generosity and intercession for children, the poor, sailors, those who have been falsely accused, . His relics repose in the Italian port city of Bari, at the opposite end of the Mediterranean Sea from his old eparchy, Myra, in Turkey.

Such is his fame and importance that every iconostas in every church that uses the Byzantine rite, Catholic or Orthodox, must have his icon at the north end of the screen. Of course, we know that the ubiquitous symbol of American Christmas celebration, Santa Claus, is a corruption of the original devotion of the Dutch founders of New York City (as New Amsterdam) to their dear Sankt Niklaus who came bearing gifts for children in the Name of the Christ Child on December 6, which is the anniversary of his death and entry into eternal life. Likewise, Kris Kringle is the English rulers' version of the German Kristkindl, or Christ Child, Who comes to bring gifts.

We know that Nicholas was born in a Christian family around the year 280 in the province of Lycia in what is now southwestern Turkey.

He became the bishop of Myra, now called Demre, a flourishing port on the coast of Asia Minor. He lived through the last persecution of Christians in the Roman Empire, that of Diocletian, one which was especially violent and bloody.

We know that Lycia was one of those territories where all bishops and priests were imprisoned, and many atrocities were carried out from 303-311. This was so bad that, when the first ecumenical council was convened in 325, witnesses described the assembled bishops as men who all showed signs of brutal torture:

amputated legs or arms or hands, eyes gouged out, terrible scars from whips. We do not know what injuries Nicholas might have borne, but we do know from the volume of testimony about him that he deeply loved our Lord Jesus Christ.

In the end, we do not have much actual history of Nicholas. What we do have, though, in the hundreds of stories that had accumulated by the year 500, is an engaging portrait of a bishop who was devoted to teaching the true faith; who gave of his own personal fortune to help anyone who was in need; who blessed sailors of the busy port of Myra, and to whom, after his death, those same sailors prayed for help when they were in danger; who defended the innocent even when they faced the imperial death penalty; and who was revered as a wonder-working saint within a century after his death.

At some point, his tomb was reopened, and his reputation was immediately enhanced when it was discovered that his bones were giving off a sticky clear substance called "Nicholas' Manna" or Myrrh. This myrrh continues to come off of his bones today in Italy, and many icons of St Nicholas have given off a similar substance, instead of the usual oil or tears that we find in Marian icons

Nicholas is the patron of Russia, Greece, sailors, children, the poor, travelers, falsely accused prisoners, pawnbrokers, and many other needs. He is also the special patron of our own Byzantine-Ruthenian Catholic Church. The center of monastic life and the residence of the bishops of our Church was the monastery of Saint Nicholas in the town of Mukachevo, for at least 700 years. Because of that history going back to medieval times, our holy Father Nicholas' feast is celebrated with joy and solemnity
