

A gallery dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe has opened at The Museum of Spanish Colonial Art in Santa Fe, on Museum Hill. Admission is \$5 for 16 and up, free on Sundays for New Mexico residents; 505-982-2226.

The first church in our state dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe is in what is now Juarez in 1668 and 1706 in Zuni Pueblo. Our Lady remains enormously popular under this title, and is the most common image made by New Mexican santeros. Pieces include retablos (paintings), bultos (statues), and nichos (shrines). Devotion to Our Lady under this title united the Spaniards, Genizaros, and new Native converts.

Owner John Wright will not only show us around the beautiful collection of Spanish Colonial religious art, but thanks to Fr. Chris and Destiny Rojo, he has offered to bring out the massive collection of Russian icons and also antique church vestments just for us.

Bl. Olympia Bida, January 28

Sister Olympia Bida was a Ukrainian Greek Catholic who entered the Sisters of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Virgin.

She served as a teacher, director of novices, and worked with the sick and elderly. After the Soviet takeover in 1944, she continued her work, and refused to join the Russian Orthodox Church. With her fellow-nuns, she continued to lead prayer services and give religious instruction, and continued to wear her habit, despite communist persecution.



Five Sisters were arrested in 1951, five years after the official suppression of the Church and their Order, and sentenced to permanent exile for "proselytizing and anti-Soviet activities." Proselytizing meant that they were keeping the Greek Catholic Church alive with prayer services and teaching in defiance of Soviet orders.

Three were deported to a labor camp in Siberia at Kharsk, near the city of Tomsk: Olympia, Laurentia, and Glyceria. They were assigned to cutting trees down in the forest in winter, and harvesting hay in the summer. They continued to wear their habits and veils. They had to walk 12 kilometers to get medical treatment, and were harassed by some villagers as "enemies of the people" and "supporters of fascist bandits." Nothing could be further from the truth! They were arrested because of their loyalty to Christ and His Church, and gradually people softened their hard hearts.

Olympia continued to teach, and she organized the other exiled Greek Catholic Sisters into groups for prayer and mutual support. She died of exhaustion and pneumonia on January 28, 1952. Sister Laurentia would die in August. Sister Glyceria walked 80 kilometers to find an exiled priest to come back with her to consecrate the graves. Both Olympia and Laurentia were beatified in 2001 by Pope John Paul II, and a Byzantine Catholic church is dedicated to them in Novosibirsk, Siberian Russia, today.

This is the traditional preparation for Sunday, and is filled with beautiful chants such as O Joyful Light, and contains Old Testament readings and prayers proper to the Tone of the coming Sunday, to help us focus more on God and His blessings upon us.

Rublican & Rharisee 2015 - Fr. Chris

Last Sunday we heard the Gospel of Zacchaeus. This marks the start of the Pre-Lenten Season. Today is officially the first Pre-Lenten Sunday.

Over the next weeks, we will be presented with different examples to follow during Great Lent. I think that this might be why some people say "Our Lent is so long!" We have six weeks of getting ready for it. **But this week is a great way to start: no fasting or abstinence!** This is so that we are not proud like the Pharisee. So if you normally abstain on Wednesday and Friday, it is almost obligatory to eat meat on those days. Now is that a great way to start or what?

On a more serious note, Father Lev Gillet says to us:

Do we have the right to condemn the Pharisee and to consider ourselves more righteous than him if, first of all, we break the commandments that the Pharisee observes? Have we the right to place ourselves – in contrast to the Pharisee – on the same level as the justified publican? We cannot do that unless our attitude is exactly the same as that of the publican ... If we ostentatiously condemn the Pharisee without becoming like the publican, we fall into Phariseeism itself.

-Year of Grace of the Lord, p. 111.

So, while eating the meat, we do well to ask ourselves all week, just how much do I recognize my sinfulness, weakness, and dependency on God? **The publican was a tax collector for the Romans**, hated by his own people and derided as a thief. But because of his recognition of his sinfulness, God not only is pleased, but *exalts* him! **This then, is a week to get started in breaking free of the chains** of minimizing my sins and exaggerating my goodness that I have wrapped around my heart and soul.
